Employment, Training and Related Services Division (ETR)

Cash Assistance

Applicants who are unable to meet essential needs such as food, clothing and shelter may be eligible for this assistance. Applicants are required to be actively searching for work, engaged in training, or participating in full-time education and must meet income guidelines. Those unable to work due to documented medical illness or injury may be exempt from work search, training or education requirements.

Child Care Assistance

Provides income-based assistance for the cost of child care (must be at a licensed child care provider) for parents who are actively seeking employment, working or who are in training for a minimum of 25 hours a week. Training, education, and safety equipment is also offered to child care providers. Child care providers do not have to meet tribal eligibility.

Post-Secondary Education

Assistance for post-secondary students who are in good standing with their accredited institution that they are enrolled in or plan to attend, up to \$2,500 per semester.

Training Assistance

Funding and/or stipend for leadership opportunities, On-the-Job-Placement (OJP), internships and vocational training up to a total of 24 months (not concurrent).

Youth Employment Services

Assistance for youth between the ages of 14 and 24 with training, employment, cultural and leadership development opportunities, and work exposure such as internships. This assistance may include financial assistance.

Adult Employment Services

Assistance with job searches, resume development, interview preparation, referrals to employers, job development, group training, work experience and community service, counseling and referrals, education, and/or employment, child care assistance, transportation (as reasonable, necessary and affordable), work clothing/tools/uniforms/supplies, and cash assistance prior to first receipt of payroll.

AANG Program

Provides vocational rehabilitation services, including culturally appropriate services, for individuals with a documented physical or mental barrier to employment or subsistence activities that are consistent with the individual's strengths, resources, priorities, concerns, abilities, capabilities, interests, and informed choice, so that such individual may prepare for, and engage in, high-quality employment that will increase opportunities for economic self-sufficiency.

Energy Assistance

Once per year heat and/or electric awards for income-eligible households with at least one Alaska Native or American Indian.

Emergency Assistance

Assistance for damage to home caused by fire, flood or other natural disaster, up to \$1,000.

Care for Adults or Children

Provides payments to a licensed, non-family member provider for Alaska Native/American Indian adults who are require care due to documented medical illness or injury or old age. Provides assistance on behalf of Alaska Native/American Indian children in a licensed foster care home.

Family Services

Burial Assistance

When eligible tribal families who have lost a loved one and lack the means to provide a memorial, this service may be able to help with one-time financial assistance towards burial costs, up to \$2,500.

Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA)

Assistance and advocacy to Tribal children and families that have found themselves involved with a State Child Protection Agency. Provides home visits and referral services to children and families identified as at-risk, arrange visitation of minors and biological parents as well as transportation, if needed. Provides families with information on the various services available to them, i.e., parenting skills training, behavior management, other support services, etc. In addition, assists families with:

- Referrals to related resources and/or other resources
- Collaborate with referring/partner agencies
- Communicate with State Agencies in assessing and developing safety plans/case plans
- Provide follow up and monitoring services
- Assess progress to determine status and revise service plan, when needed

Tribal Child Support Program (TCSP)

Establishes and enforces child support orders. Provides services such as paternity establishment and parent locate for purposes of child support.

Head Start

Head Start serves preschool-age children and their families who have incomes below the federal poverty level.

Head Start programs offer a variety of service models, depending on the needs of the local community. Programs may be based in:

- Centers or schools that children attend for part-day or full-day services
- Family child care homes
- Children's own homes, where a staff person visits once a week to provide services to the child and family. Children and families who receive home-based services gather periodically with other enrolled families for a group learning experience facilitated by Head Start staff.

Self-Governance

Delivers technical assistance to tribes requesting information and guidance with the following objectives:

- Remain diligent in preserving and protecting tribal sovereignty, culture, history, and tribal self-governing authority.
- Support proactive, tribally-driven measures to advance and expand self-governance.
- Assist with self-governance education to provide accurate information on tribal identified needs and priorities.
- Develop new tribal relationships and build upon existing relations.
- Advocate for budget increases and funding which benefit Aleut tribes and their members.
- Assist tribal governments to ensure signed agreements entered with the federal government are honored and fully implemented.

Self-Governance Technical Assistance:

Tribal operations provides a wide variety of technical assistance, on-site and off, intended to assist tribal governments in becoming more self-sufficient and better able to enhance the social and economic condition of their people.

Village Public Safety Officer (VPSO)

Provides VPSO's to the Aleutian Pribilof regional communities. VPSO's perform law enforcement duties and are first responders to many types of emergencies, to include but not limited to, fire, medical, and search and rescue. VPSO's also provide public safety education within their communities.
