APIA's Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) goals and objectives are centered on strengthening community stability and advancing household self-sufficiency through targeted energy assistance for low-income families. Given the unique climate challenges faced by our community, safe and reliable home heating is essential to maintaining health, housing stability, and economic security. Through this grant, we will provide supplemental heating assistance that directly addresses critical barriers faced by vulnerable households.

Our primary objective is removing obstacles that block the achievement of self-sufficiency. High energy costs disproportionately affect low-income households, often forcing difficult trade-offs between heating, food, medical care, and other essential needs. By offsetting heating expenses, this program will alleviate financial stress, enabling families to redirect limited resources toward long-term stability goals such as employment, education, and debt reduction.

A second goal is making better use of available income. Supplemental heating assistance reduces the burden of utility costs during peak winter months, helping households stretch their income further. Families are better positioned to budget effectively, avoid late fees or service interruptions, and maintain financial resilience.

In addition, the program supports households in obtaining and maintaining adequate housing. Access to heating is a fundamental component of habitable housing in our region. By ensuring that homes remain safely heated, we reduce the risk of eviction or displacement due to utility shutoffs, protect housing infrastructure from damage caused by freezing conditions, and support overall housing stability.

CSBG funding will also directly contribute to households obtaining emergency assistance by providing timely intervention for those facing immediate heating crises. Whether due to unexpected financial hardship, rising energy costs, or seasonal extremes, this assistance serves as a safety net that prevents emergencies from escalating into larger, more costly crises.

Finally, our service delivery emphasizes linkages to fill service gaps by connecting participants with additional supportive services. While providing heating assistance, we will also engage households in referrals to other services such as employment services, vocational rehabilitation, higher education/vocational training scholarships, child care, child support, and Head Start. This integrated approach ensures that participants receive comprehensive support beyond immediate needs.

Through the strategic use of CSBG funding, the Tribe/Tribal Organization will deliver a responsive and culturally appropriate program that addresses both immediate heating needs and long-term self-sufficiency. By stabilizing households, preserving housing, and connecting community members to broader resources, this initiative will strengthen the overall well-being of our communities.

Eligibility is aligned with APIA's Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), including what is considered countable income. CSBG services will be provided to households with incomes at or below 125% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines (FPG). Households that have been determined eligible for LIHEAP are deemed categorically eligible for CSBG-supported supplemental heating assistance, which streamlines the intake process and reduces administrative burden for both applicants and staff. Standard eligibility determination includes verification of household income, size, and residency within the service area. Documentation may include pay stubs, fishing settlements, or self-attestation when usual documentation is not available. Staff are trained to apply consistent procedures to ensure fair and equitable access to services. In cases where individual income verification is not possible or practical—such as for households with informal income, seasonal employment, or loss of documentation—alternative methods are used. These may include written self-declarations signed by the applicant, or verbal attestations over the phone.

APIA will carry out the required CSBG programmatic assurances through a coordinated, community-focused service delivery approach designed to meet the immediate and long-term needs of low-income households.

a. CSBG Service Delivery System

CSBG services will be delivered through an integrated intake and eligibility system aligned with the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP). Households will apply through established program channels, where eligibility is determined and services are coordinated. The primary service supported by CSBG funds will be supplemental heating assistance, ensuring timely and efficient delivery of benefits to eligible households. Staff will utilize standardized procedures and data systems to track services.

b. Geographical Areas and Categories of Individuals to be Served

Services will be provided to eligible low-income households within the 10 communities of APIA's service area (see 1.2.b.). Priority will be given to vulnerable populations, including elders, households with young children, and individuals with disabilities. All participants must meet income eligibility at or below 125% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines.

c. Criteria and Method Used for Distribution of CSBG Funds

CSBG funds will be distributed based on eligibility criteria consistent with federal guidelines and aligned with LIHEAP determinations. Funds will be allocated to households demonstrating the greatest need, particularly those at risk of utility shutoff or experiencing a heating emergency. Distribution will be aligned with established LIHEAP processes, making payments directly to utility vendors. Internal controls and monitoring procedures will guide equitable and compliant fund distribution.

d. Purpose of Funds and Supported Activities

The primary purpose of CSBG funding is to provide supplemental heating assistance to low-income households. This assistance helps offset high energy costs during extreme weather conditions, supporting household stability and health. Activities include processing applications, verifying eligibility, issuing payments, providing referrals, and conducting outreach to ensure eligible households are aware of available support. These efforts directly address barriers to self-sufficiency and prevent crises related to inadequate heating.

e. Linkages to Fill Identified Gaps in Services

APIA will actively connect participants to additional resources to address broader needs. During intake and service delivery, households will receive referrals to complementary services and programs. These linkages help fill service gaps and promote a more comprehensive pathway to stability and self-sufficiency.

f. Coordination with Other Public and Private Resources

APIA will coordinate with federal, state, Tribal, and local partners as available to maximize resources and avoid duplication of services. Ongoing communication with partner organizations, including the 13 Tribes served, strengthens service delivery and responsiveness to community needs.

g. Innovative Community and Neighborhood-Based Initiatives

APIA will implement community-based outreach initiatives by leveraging existing fundings to support in-person travel to visit the 10 communities within the service area. Staff will travel to each community to host local events, such as community gatherings or potlucks, creating a welcoming and culturally appropriate environment for engagement. If, due to weather or scheduling conflicts, staff are unable to reach a community in-person, we will connect with community liaisons and/or tribal administrators to engage with the community indirectly. These events will provide opportunities to connect directly with households, share information, and assist with enrollment in services. This approach strengthens relationships, improves access to services in remote areas, and ensures that assistance reaches those who may face barriers to traditional application methods.
